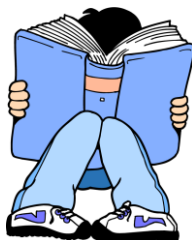

Seventh Grade Resource Students: A novel of your choice
(It must be fiction, and it must be a minimum of 100 pages.)

*Lexile levels measure how complex a text is to read. Features that affect the score are sentence length, vocabulary, and structure and syntax. Lower scored texts will be more accessible to readers. Please note that a book with a lower Lexile level can still have complex themes and characters.

While you are reading, you will need to keep track of important/interesting parts of the text as well as your thinking. On the back of this sheet are directions for the assignment that accompanies your summer reading.



Two-Column Notes Assignment

Keep track of important parts of the novel as well as your thinking with two-column notes.

- Make two columns on notebook paper – one for quotes and one for your thinking.
- In the Quotes column, copy important lines from the story. Use the author’s last name and the page number to cite where you found the line. These lines can be parts of the story you found interesting, surprising, confusing, etc.
- In the My Thinking column, record your thoughts about this part of the story. This can be questions you have, connections you made to the text, predictions, things you notice about the language, etc.

Here is an example from the book *Brown Girl Dreaming*.

Quotes	My Thinking
no returns “Take her back, we already have one of those.” (Woodson 19)	How often have I thought about wanting to give back my brother? Wonder how often he thought about sending me back? Luckily, we kept each other...we get along now...most of the time.
the garden “God gives you what you need,...Best not to ask for more than that.” (Woodson 49)	Yipes! I am always praying for more: help with this or that, take care of this or that...hmm, wonder what God would say to this?
“and stars and tears and hope.” (Woodson 106)	This is interesting. I wonder why the author wrote it like this: two words on one line. I like the first and third lines.
because we’re witnesses “No...pretend...never go to...will never...” actually this whole page (Woodson 164)	I wonder what it is like to be a witness. I wonder if the author continued to be a witness.
hope onstage “Hope can sing...” (Woodson 232)	This is personification! I really like this phrase. Personally, I feel better hearing music and I love to sing (even though I don’t sound all that great) because singing and music do make me feel hopeful.

Level Students: Have a minimum of **10 entries** in your two column notes.

Pre-AP Students: Have a minimum of **15 entries** in your two-column notes.

Quotes must be chosen from throughout the novel, not just the beginning chapters.

Book and assignment should be finished over the summer. Teachers will discuss due dates with students during the first week of school.
